June 23rd the church celebrated the feast of Corpus Christi, Latin for something you hear every time you receive Holy Communion, Body of Christ. The church marks this day as a celebration of Christ's gift of the Eucharist. It is a reminder that



this gift we receive in communion and what is reserved in the tabernacle is the REAL PRESENCE OF CHRIST - BODY, BLOOD, SOUL & DIVINITY! Here Are Some Even More Frequently Asked Questions about the Upcoming Linking of Good Shepherd and Immaculate Conception Parishes and Their Answers. If You Have Even More Questions or If You Need More Information, Please Don't Hesitate to Ask.

What is the difference between linked parishes and merged parishes?

Linked parishes, like Immaculate Conception and Good Shepherd, happen when two or more parishes share a pastor. In a linkage, the parishes remain distinct canonical entities that are served by one pastor.

When parishes merge they become a single parish – in many cases adopting a completely new parish name. In this case, the church buildings retain their original names.

Will the Faith Formation schedules be changing?

FAITH FORMATION

Each parish will be retaining its individual religious education classes. Good Shepherd with continue to have its Faith Formation classes on Monday evenings from . Immaculate Conception will continue to have its Faith Formation classes on Sunday morning, but the time will be changed to 9:45-10:45 AM so that the children can leave class and go directly to mass at 11:00 AM. It is our hope that through social interaction, learning from each other, and then collaborating together, we will strengthen and enhance the overall quality of both Religious Education programs.

Now that both parishes are sharing one priest, when will Father Kloton be available at each parish?

Father Mike would like to take several weeks following the linkage to become familiar with his new parish and to appreciate the pastoral needs of Good Shepherd parish. He will then determine his schedule to serve as pastor for both parishes in the new linkage. He will be available in his office at each parish two days per week. Father Mike's day off is Wednesday. However, whether Father is at Good Shepherd or Immaculate Conception, he is always only a phone call away. Both Erin and Janet are able to contact Father Mike should the need arise.

Will the persons serving on committees or in ministries at Good Shepherd parish be able to meet with Father Kloton?

As soon as the new linkage is effective on August 1, 2019, Father Kloton will be setting up information-sharing meetings with the finance council and liturgical ministers (Lectors and Extraordinary Ministers of Communion).

Additionally, Father Kloton would like to form a Liturgy Committee. There is a purpose behind each liturgical season, and the environment should focus the parishioner to its message and meaning. Flowers and a fountain at Easter, red strategically placed at the altar for Pentecost, the crib for Christmas all require brainstorming and in some cases a lot of elbow grease. If you love to organize events, work with your hands, and enjoy the research that goes into the liturgical calendar year, consider a ministry of the Liturgy Committee. "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." It is very important that everyone realize that ANYONE can be a member of the Liturgy Committee.

Will there be a change in the current staff at either parish in the new linkage?

As we begin the new linkage, there are no plans to change any of the current staff in either parish.

Where will we park at Immaculate Conception Parish?

Immaculate Conception has its own parking lot in the rear of the church. Also, parking is available in the Senior Citizens parking lot around the corner on Washington and Chestnut Streets.

To help everyone better understand the parking availability at Immaculate Conception Parish, a map has been attached which illustrates how to arrive at each of the two available parking lots.

If you are parking in the parish lot, when you come up the "Freeland Mountain", turn left at the traffic light. When you pass Immaculate Conception Church, turn left again and the parking lot will be on the left. If you are parking in the Senior Citizens parking lot, go through the traffic light and turn left on the first street, which is Washington Street. Continue past four streets (Main, Front, Walnut, and Chestnut). The parking lot is on the left. You enter from Washington Street.
