## ANNUAL CHILDREN'S WARM WINTER COAT COLLECTION



Winter will be upon us before we know it! We are seeking **NEW**, warm winter coats for the needy children in our Freeland Community. Many children come to us in coats that are worn thin and much too small for them. Their parents are doing the best they can, but they struggle to give their children the basic necessities.

I would like to share with you a few stories about the children you are helping. One little girl, about four years old, had selected a soft bunny-fur coat and as she was picking out her gloves, she told her seven-year-old brother, "I am never taking this coat off." His reply was, "See, I promised you wouldn't be cold this year." Then he turned to us and thanked us for helping him and his sister. He said that it was so good to be warm.

A father brought his children in, and his expression was most unhappy. I asked him if everything was all right and he commented that he had just lost his job and wasn't comfortable accepting charity to clothe his children. I assured him that we have no charity here. We are Messengers of Hope, not charity. His entire demeanor changed and he said that hope was something he could live with. We all need a little hope.

And lastly, I'd like to share with you a nine-year-old boy who was so happy because he got a coat in his favorite colors, red and black. When he found gloves and a hat to match, he was just thrilled. He came around behind the table and whispered in my ear that he saw his mom crying because his brothers and sister needed coats and she didn't know what to do. Then her friend told her about our parish giving coats and she called to see if she could get them for her children. He thanked us for helping his mom.

These children just melt your heart! They know they are in need and they are so grateful that someone is there to help them. That someone is YOU! There are many, many more stories like these. We need all sizes for boys and girls from infants and toddlers to adult XXL. If you would like to donate a coat, you can drop it off at the parish office or place it on the right side of the altar steps by the organ. If you

would prefer to make a donation, you can drop it off at the parish office or place it in the collection basket in an envelope marked "Coats," and one of the Messengers of Hope will purchase a coat. Last year we distributed over 125 coats to needy children who would not otherwise have had a warm coat at all. All donations must made by Sunday, October 27th. Distribution is Saturday, November 9th, from 9:00 AM till noon.



## Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551).

Aviso al Respecto de Reportar el Abuso Sexual de Un Menor de Edad Es la norma de la Diócesis de Scranton reportar cualquier alegación de abuso sexual de un menor de edad a las autoridades. Si usted es una víctima de abuso sexual cometido por un sacerdote, diácono, religioso o empleado laico, o voluntario de la Diócesis de Scranton, usted está obligado a reportar el asunto inmediatamente a las autoridades de la ley. Si algún sacerdote, diácono, religioso, empleado laico o voluntario de la Diócesis de Scranton tiene sospecha de que un menor de edad ha sido sujeto a cualquier forma de abuso, incluyendo abuso sexual de menor de edad, el asunto será reportado a las autoridades de la ley. Es la norma de la Diócesis defender todas las regulaciones civiles y del estado. Al fi n de gue la Diócesis esté comprometida igualmente a defender las normas del Código de Derecho Canónico y defender los principios de la Carta Para la Protección de Niños y Jóvenes (Conferencia de los Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos), lo cual incluye apoyar a las víctimas de abuso sexual en pos del bienestar emocional y espiritual.
