A MESSAGE FROM FATHER MIKE:



Both this weekend and next we will hear about John the Baptist. Most of us know that John the Baptist was a cousin to Jesus. The job of John the Baptist was twofold: first to announce repentance and secondly to prepare the way of the Lord. As we continue on our

Advent journey, I encourage you to think about those two things. Each Parish will have additional time for reconciliation. Also, it is how we prepare for the coming of Jesus that is most important. Prepare your heart and your soul for the coming of Jesus. John the Baptist did a great job getting us ready. What will you do to get yourself ready for the coming of Jesus?

A VIEW FROM THE PEW, WHAT IS THE ANGELUS?



The Angelus is a prayer with an ancient history that dates to the 12th century. The prayer evolved from the custom of reciting three Hail Marys in the evening, a tradition promoted by St. Anthony of Padua. This evening prayer was taken up By the Order of the Friars Minor. A church bell was rung, so the brothers and

villagers knew that it was time for prayer. As time passed three Hail Marys were recited in the morning, noon, and evening, which today is known as the Liturgy of the Hours. This practice continued and eventually evolved into the prayer we know today as The Angelus. The prayer takes its name from the words of the angel Gabriel to Mary, Angelus Domini nuntiavit Maria, ("the Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary.") Luke 1:26-38. The Angelus recounts the Annunciation, includes three Hail Marys and finishes with an appeal for God's grace. During the Easter season the Regina Caeli or Queen of Heaven is usually substituted for the Angelus. This prayer or hymn celebrates the joy of the Resurrection of Christ. This centuries old ritual and simple prayer are an easy way to reflect during the day on the fulfilment of God's promise of salvation, "And the Word Was Made Flesh and Dwelt Among Us..."
